



Overview of Nihon University







Nihon University is one of Japan's largest private universities, comprising 12 colleges and 4 schools with 86 departments, 19 graduate schools, 24 attached and affiliated high schools, 16 attached and affiliated junior high schools, 3 elementary schools, 3 kindergartens and a certified Child's Garden.

The university's forerunner, Nihon Law School, was founded in 1889, and since then Nihon University has continued to lead education and research with a consistently global perspective and progressive spirit.

Offering a diverse range of disciplines, as a true university with appeal, Nihon University undertakes various activities such as medical care and lifelong education, in addition to its educational and research activities, with a view to contributing to the further development of society.

Overview of the Japanese Language and Japan Studies Program (JLSP)

Nihon University offers the Japanese Language and Japan Studies Program (JLSP) to exchange students from overseas universities with which Nihon University has established inter-university exchange agreements. Under the JLSP, international exchange program students undergo short-term intensive Japanese language and cultural / social education.

The program offers 3 subjects; Japanese Language Subjects (Comprehensive Japanese / Elective Japanese), Japan Studies Subjects (taught in English), and Cultural Activities (in which Nihon University student volunteers also participate).



Features of the Japanese Language and Japan Studies Program (JLSP)

Short-term Intensive Japanese Language Course = 150 hours / 50 days



Approximately two-and-a-half-month period students study comprehensive Japanese language intensively for 150 hours (3 hours per day for 50 days); 150 hours is the basic number of study hours required to advance one level of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test.

1st [Summer] Term

2nd [Fall] Term (mid-September to early-December) Brd [Spring] Term mid-January to late-March)

*JLSP is a one-term program; the same program is offered three times in an academic year.

■ Japanese Language Course Level Placement = 5 Levels of Comprehensive Japanese Language (Compulsory Courses); 5 Subjects of Elective Japanese Language (Elective Courses)

Students are placed in courses according to the level of their Japanese language proficiency to enable them to study the language efficiently in a short period of time. The 5 compulsory comprehensive Japanese levels (A-E)* are applicable to the study levels for the Japanese Language Proficiency Test.

Elective subjects are designed to focus on "students' direct experience and output" and enhance their autonomous learning.

*Levels are decided based on the results of a placement test conducted before start of courses.



■ Understanding of Japanese Society / Culture and Cultural Activities



To enable students to deepen their knowledge and understanding of J apanese society and culture, and also to raise the awareness of intercultural literacy, the J LSP provides the J apan Studies Subject as well as the Cultural Activities. In the Japan Studies Subject, students study in English about J apanese economy, art, issues that modern society is facing, and behavioral patterns. In the Cultural Activities, students experience Japanese society and culture directly using Japanese words and expressions actually used by native speakers.

□ Collaboration with Volunteers

Japanese students from Nihon University participate as volunteers in the Cultural Activities in both inside and outside the classroom. Through these collaborative activities with volunteers, students deepen their exchange with Japanese people.

Comprehensive Japanese / Elective Japanese

□ Comprehensive Japanese

This course comprises compulsory courses aimed at comprehensively raising students' Japanese language reading/writing/listening/speaking proficiency. Courses are placed in 5 levels (A-E) and students study Japanese intensively in small classes of their levels for 150 hours during the term. Up to the Intermediate level, courses are based on textbooks and students comprehensively improve their overall Japanese language proficiency. At the Advanced level, there are separate classes for each language skill (reading/writing/listening/speaking/grammar) and different textbooks and materials are used to enable students to acquire an even higher level of Japanese language proficiency.



Activities outside the classroom and discussions with Nihon University student volunteers are conducted to enable students to use and practice the Japanese language skills they have learned.



■ Elective Japanese

5 elective subjects (Communication, Creation, Inquiring*, Intercultural Experience, Autonomous Learning) are placed for academic purposes.
Students are able to improve Japanese language proficiency by using Japanese language that you learned in Comprehensive Japanese courses.
Nihon University student volunteers join together.
Students are able to choose subjects freely in accordance with their needs and interests.

Japan Studies

Japan Studies Courses are compulsory courses taught in English, aimed at helping students enhance their knowledge of Japanese society, culture and people, think introspectively about questions they may have regarding Japanese culture. Students attend lectures and participate in discussions on Japanese culture, economy and various other subjects.



Cultural Activities *The events might be changed or cancelled depending on the situation.

The aim of this course is to encourage students to acquire the sense of intercultural literacy as well as global perspective by interacting with their surroundings of things and humans. The three Cultural Activities courses are aimed at raising the awareness of students' views on Japanese culture, and various friends'cultures. These three Cultural Activities courses give the students' new perspectives on by allowing them to actual experience of Japanese society and culture while fostering friendship with our volunteers.

POINT Visit to the Life Safety Learning Center

With a view to better understanding Japan's geographical characteristics, students learn about the prevalence of earthquakes, fires, and typhoons in Japan and experience simulations of how to respond in case any of these events occurs.



POINT Study Tour

The aim of this trip is to enable students to come in contact with Japanese society and culture. Students can enjoy various aspects of Japanese traditional and modern cultures. On study tours, student volunteers of Nihon University accompany international students and form mixed groups to deepen cultural exchange.



POINT Seeing a Kabuki Performance

To understand more about traditional Japanese culture, students attend a performance of Kabuki. Through this experience, students can deepen their understanding of the "sophistication" of traditional Japanese culture and how Japanese people enjoy their culture.

As an Australian New Columbo Plan Scholar striving towards working in Japan in the future, the JLSP classes at Nihon University were exactly what I was looking for to push not only my comprehension ability, but also my speaking ability to the next level. The five different classes you could choose to be a part of were tailored to have content matching that of the JLPT and CEFR Japanese exams, meaning that there is a place for anybody, of any level to join. As the classes are almost exclusively taught in Japanese, it's a wonderful way to learn from a very natural perspective. There is a trial week for the Japanese classes, so you are free to change classes if you think that the content is too difficult, or too easy, which is a fantastic feature to be included for peace of mind. During class every week, I constantly found myself being challenged to communicate and present my ideas about various topics by my teachers, and I almost always had the autonomy to choose my own subject matter when conducting research for my presentations.

There are also abundant opportunities to practice the grammar and new vocabulary that I've learned in class, as volunteer native Japanese students frequent the JLSP facilities to assist with the classes, allowing an opportunity to practice natural, everyday speech very often, often culminating into small excursions out into the surrounding area of Tokyo together. Also offered as a service is a non-obligatory language exchange program, where you can meet one-on-one with a native Japanese speaking for an hour and a half, training both your Japanese ability for half of the time, as well as helping teach the volunteer your native language for the other half.

During this course, we were also given the opportunity go on excursions with the cohort and volunteer students to many different locations such as a natural disaster simulation facility, the ancient and traditional temples and Great Buddha of Kamakura, and even an outing to a local Kabuki theatre to watch the unique storytelling and dances passed down for generations.

Overall, a very enjoyable and memorable experience! I would highly recommend this course to anybody that has a strong passion for learning Japanese, and would like an organic, immersive time studying in Japan.

Campus and Accommodations
